Gale on the Lake.

The "Marengo," the vessel mentioned in the Cleveland papers as being off that port, with a signal of distress, was towed into port on Saturday morning, by the Great Western. She was in ballast, intending to take in a load of coal for Detroit. She was out during the gale, and lost all her sails, but was otherwise uninjured.

We are indebted to the Cleveland Plain Dealer and Herald for slips dated Saturday, 9 P. M., giving accounts of the disasters on the Lake, so far as they had been then received—and from which we make the following extract:—

The gale Thursday night was destructive to shipping and life below.—The New Orleans came in this evening and we copy the following memoranda furnished the Plain Dealer.

The New Orleans made Erie on the night of the gale, escaping narrowly, and the steamer Madison made that port, with the loss of her smoke pipes and encountering much peril.

It was reported at Erie, that six vessels were ashore between that place & Barcelona, and that all hands were supposed to be lost on three of them.

The Herald speaks of the gale as the most severe which has been experienced on the Lake for several years.—The Plain Dealer of Saturday evening says: The Lake has become calm again. The Great Western passed down this morning. No boat up yet.

Robbery!

On last Sunday night, Mr. T. Stark, a Silversmith shop was broken into and robbed of something like \$500 worth of Jewelry and Watches. The thief effected an entrance by cutting out a panel of the front door. It appears that the pattern shop of the new foundry of Barlow and Gowdy was first broken open and a search made for money in their desk; but none was obtained.—Some chisels were then taken, with which the door of Mr. Stark's shop was cut. The drawers and cases were pretty thoroughly rifled; but in his haste the thief luckily overlooked in one of the drawers two valuable Gold Watches, and in another some \$60 in specie and a valuable set of Odd Fellows' Jew-

els. Mr. Stark has issued a handbill, describing his goods and offering a reward of \$50 for their recovery and the detection of the thief or thieves. Suspicion attaches to no one here; but whoever was guilty of the crime will have a close run, as every means are being taken to ferret the matter out.

Our citizens would do well to be on the look out for rascals, as this is the season of the year when more robberies take place in the country, than at any other. We hardly take up a paper now, among our exchanges, without finding recorded an account of a robbery of some description.

Murder.

We learn that a murder was committed at Springfield, last Saturday night, of a most cold-blooded nature. As far as we have been able to ascertain the particulars, they are as follows:—

The body of a young man by the name of Peck was found in Buck creek with the skull broken and the throat cut. Suspicion attached to one Otho Davison, and he was arrested, together with a young man from this town; but the proof given on the preliminary examination, almost entirely exonerates the latter; and he is now detained as a witness. All the circumstances which have come to light tend to fasten the crime upon Davison; but no reason is known for the perpetration of the crime.—Ib.

Thomas Corwin.

The Piqua Register has run up the flag for Mr. Corwin, as the candidate of the Whig party for the Presidency in 1848. The Register remarks:

There is our candidate for the next Presidency, if a Whig National Convention so will it. We are Whig all over and will support any good man who may get the nomination, but we prefer Mr. Corwin to any other man except Mr. Clay, who, we suppose, is now out of question. That it is too early to agitate the question, we are fully aware; but as it has been done elsewhere, and will continue to be agitated till a nomination be made, we may as well have our say as any body else. We have not a doubt but that Mr. Corwin is the choice of nine tenths of

the Whigs of the State, notwithstanding the efforts a few to create a different impression. He is the man for Ohio Whigs, and it is useless to talk of any one else in this State. In this we think we cannot be mistaken. We have therefore placed his name at the head of our editorial columns to remain there, till the next Presidential election unless authorized by a National Convention or Mr. Corwin himself to take it down.

The Dayton convention.

The Sons of Temperance had a noble celebration at Dayton on Thursday last. Delegates were present from nearly all the Divisions within forty miles of the city. The procession numbering 500, proceeded to the New Hall where Samuel Galloway, Esq., of this city, delivered a very interesting address. We add the remarks of the Daytonian:

Of Hon. Mr. Galloway's address, we cannot give even an outline. It was such as deeply to engage the attention of the audience, and frequently called forth applause. It gave a sketch of the Association, and answered, we think satisfactorily, the objections that are urged against it. Its sarcasms upon the "street corner," "store box dances," and the "Cod-fish aristocracy" who make fun of the Association, were such as would have made them hide their faces behind their soap-locks, had they listened to them!

A Novelty.

A Dr. Russel, lately on trial in Michigan for poisoning his wife, has been acquitted—on what grounds does not appear—perhaps through somnambulism, or any other kind of "ism" which our legal friends know so well how to illustrate. The trial had created so much excitement there was considerable difficulty found in empanelling a Jury. One of the challenged, on the usual question being put to him whether he had formed any opinion on the subject, replied he did not know whether he had or not, but he never took any newspaper! He was passed out immediately as unfit for any duty.

Congress, and the Ohio Legislature meet next Monday.

The publication of our paper this week, has been delayed beyond the usual day, by the extra labor and trouble in getting out the Delinquent List, which occupies a considerable portion of our space to the exclusion of reading matter. The List will be published four weeks, after which time we shall be able to give the usual amount of news, &c.

John Quincy Adams.

Mr. ADAMS was attacked a few days since with a paralysis of his left side, which for a time rendered him nearly insensible.—But he was better at the last accounts, and was not supposed to be in any immediate danger. He is now about 80 years old.

LATE FROM MEXICO.

Gen. Scott and his staff have been ordered to Mexico to give additional spirit and direction to the Army.—This new movement is the result of recent Cabinet conferences, and has grown out of recent events in Mexico, and advices from the head quarters of the Army. Gen. Scott was to leave Washington on the 24th Nov. His destination is Tampico, but with large additional powers to control his actions when upon the ground. It is understood that both the Navy and War Departments are making active preparations for an attack upon Tampico.—The force under Gen. Patterson will march from Matamoros down by the coast through Tamaulipas. On the 26th of Oct. the Squadron, under command of Com. Perry, captured Tabasco, and made prizes of a number of Mexican vessels in that port.—When the city was summoned to surrender, the people were all in favor of yielding at once, but the Gov. and soldiery opposed, and refused to let the people leave the city; and many of them took refuge in the cellars during the bombardment.

Santa Anna is rapidly concentrating his forces at San Louis Potosi, with a view of marching to attack General Taylor.

Statistics.

The result of the labors of the late State Board of Equalization discloses some valuable facts in reference to the statistics of our State, which cannot but prove interesting to every reader. We would gladly give the tabular statement entire, but our present limits will not admit of it—and mere figures cannot well be condensed. We therefore satisfy ourselves for the present with a few general results.

There are, then, as shown by the duplicates of the 83 counties comprising the State of Ohio, twenty-three millions four hundred and thirty-six thousand and sixty two acres of taxable land in the State.
